earnings for preschool, high school, and other special education teachers usually range from \$56,680 to \$60,000. The job outlook for special education teachers is expected to be around 3% from 2019 to 2029, which is slightly weaker than the average income. Wage is one of the elements of a career that adds to its gratification.

In the United States, the job market for special education teachers is stable. In the United States, there are estimates that there are approximately 131,900 special education teachers. Between 2016 and 2026, the job market for special education teachers is expected to grow by 7.4 percent. It is expected that the United States will contain 13,300 special education teachers over the next ten years. This amount is done by the addition of 9,700 new special education teachers and the savings and investments of 3,600 current special education teachers.

Also according to IDEA, "to the fullest extent necessary, children with disabilities... are taught with children who are not disabled, and that special classes, separate education, or another removal of children with disabilities from the regular environment, happens only when the type or intensity of the disability is that education in normal classes with the use of supplementary aids and programs is not appropriate." As a result, it is largely dependent on the disability level of the student.

When children are determined to be eligible for special education, their families often feel that they will be put in a classroom with children who are not their age. However, most students who classify for special education spend the rest of their time in regular classrooms. Many of the classrooms are diverse. Teachers from general education and special education combine in a classroom to meet the needs of the students. Sometimes when the student with the disability is on the same education level as the other students. They usually need as much attention as others.

There are many ways to set up diverse classrooms. Special education teachers are brought together at different times of the day to teach in other regular classrooms instead of pulling kids out of class to a separate room. Both teachers are glad to advise all students in any incident.
